## NC Student Success Center Partners with ACUE to Advance Statewide Student Success Efforts Online

August 14, 2020—The North Carolina Student Success Center (NC SSC) and the <u>Association of College</u> and <u>University Educators</u> (ACUE) have partnered to advance student achievement across the <u>North</u> <u>Carolina Community College System</u>. Through ACUE's nationally-recognized credentialing programs, faculty will develop evidence-based teaching practices for online instruction to ensure a high-quality, equitable college education is available to students.

In July, cohorts of faculty from across the North Carolina Community College System enrolled in ACUE's microcredential course on "**Creating an Inclusive and Supportive Learning Environment**." This program will support faculty to start the new academic year with practical and evidence-based teaching approaches shown to <u>improve student achievement and close equity gaps</u>. Faculty will also earn credit toward ACUE's Certificate in Effective College Instruction, the only nationally-recognized college teaching credential endorsed by the American Council on Education.

"As thousands of faculty in the North Carolina Community College System prepare for long-term use of digital learning tools, they expressed an urgent need for professional development in online instruction," said Susan Barbitta, executive director of the NC Student Success Center.

The interest led NC SSC, a member of the <u>Student Success Center Network</u> supported by Jobs For the Future (JFF), to pursue scalable, effective teaching practices for quality instruction in North Carolina's 58 community colleges.

"The need for best practices in online teaching and strategies for achieving equity is more apparent than ever," said Barbitta. "With such an urgent issue, we were eager to offer our faculty the tools they—and their students—need to succeed. That's the mission of our Center—to advance and scale sustainable statewide student success and completion efforts, serve as a resource hub for shared learning, technical assistance, idea generation and policy advocacy."

"We're thrilled to partner with the NC SSC to further student success and educational equity. It's an honor to be able to help faculty strengthen their online teaching skills," said Jonathan Gyurko, president and co-founder of ACUE. "Through our partnerships nationwide, we find strong evidence of stronger, more equitable achievement among students taught by ACUE-credentialed faculty. We're eager to have this same impact in North Carolina's community colleges."

This program is offered as part of the <u>Every Learner Everywhere</u> (ELE) initiative, supported by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation through a grant approved by Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors. The program was made possible by the NC SSC's longstanding relationship with <u>Achieving the Dream</u> (ATD), an ELE





network partner. Founded in 2004, Achieving the Dream has led a national movement to improve student outcomes, close achievement gaps and advance equity across America's community colleges.
